Venue: **Claggett Center** (For GPS, use 3035 Buckeystown Pike, Adamstown, MD 21710)

Civil War sites all around

- **Gettysburg (PA) National Battlefield** – a turning point and inspiration for Abraham Lincoln's oft-quoted Gettysburg Address; visitors center features not-to-be-missed cyclorama. www.nps.gov/gett
- **Antietam (MD) National Battlefield** – single bloodiest day in American history and led to Lincoln issuing the Emancipation Proclamation. www.nps.gov/anti
- **Harpers Ferry (WV)** – quaint, completely restored Civil War-era hillside town fronting on two rivers that was the site of John Brown's raid, heightening tensions before the war's outbreak. www.nps.gov/hafe

Two very different homes ... and an early schoolhouse

Outside Pittsburgh not far off I-70 is **Fallingwater**, one of the most acclaimed houses by the famous architect Frank Lloyd Wright, and **Meadowcroft Rockshelter**, one of the oldest documented sites of human habitation in North America (in a massive, 16,000-year-old rock overhang); **Meadowcroft Historic Village** also on-site includes a magnificently-restored 1834 one-room schoolhouse. www.fallingwater.com and www.heinzhistorycenter.org/meadowcroft

Birthplace of parochial education

Between Gettysburg and the Claggett Center along US Rt. 15 is **Seton Shrine**, commemorating the little-known first American-born Catholic saint, Elizabeth Ann Seton, who also founded on this site the first parochial school in the U.S. www.setonshrine.org

Amish and Mennonite communities

Depending on the direction you're coming from, Amish communities can be found in various spots, notably **Lancaster, PA**, about 60 miles west of Philadelphia, and **Holmes County, OH**, south of Cleveland and west of Pittsburgh. In Virginia, Mennonites are more numerous, mainly in the **Shenandoah Valley** (along I-81).

Presidential homes

Virginia is home to George Washington's **Mount Vernon** (Alexandria); Thomas Jefferson's **Monticello** (Charlottesville); and James Madison's **Montpelier** (Orange). All 3 sites have recently added exhibits on the role of slavery. www.mountvernon.org; www.monticello.org; and www.montpelier.org

Unusual natural formations

Also in Virginia: **Luray Caverns**, "geology's hall of fame" – the largest and most spectacular caverns on the east coast (and naturally air conditioned to boot!) and **Natural Bridge**, a 215-foot tall limestone gorge carved out by a small creek; both off I-81 from the south. www.luraycaverns.com and www.dcr.virginia.gov/state-parks/natural-bridge#general_information
